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CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S MESSAGE



Welcome to our 2024 Annual Review describing how we delivered our charitable objectives in a year when HRH The Duke of Gloucester celebrated his 50th anniversary as the Foundation's Patron.

It is a truly remarkable achievement. Much has changed since The Duke inherited the position from his father Prince Henry in 1974. The advent of the Sports Lottery and the Football Foundation has dramatically changed the landscape of grassroots sport and has been the catalyst for the modernisation of most of our facilities. We also became an acquirer rather than a disposer of sites under threat and have launched a plethora of sportsbased inclusion projects aimed at addressing health, social and economic inequalities, all under His Royal Highness' beneficent patronage.

In line with one of the key themes of our Three Year Plan, we actively pursued our future proofing objective with the replacement of the 3G surface at Douglas Eyre Sports Centre, the retrofit of LED floodlights at Douglas Eyre and Peter May Sports Centres and the installation of a new boiler at LMPF Redbridge. At a time when energy prices are increasing alarmingly, we were particularly pleased to make modifications that should significantly reduce gas and electricity consumption.

Running parallel to the need to control operational expenditure, is the importance of maintaining our fundraising output so we are delighted to report that the 2024 LPFF Quiz at The Oval was the most successful ever in terms of funds raised. This was followed by our second Golf Day this time at the prestigious Woburn GC and our Gala Dinner at The Savoy.

was the unveiling of the Harry Kane statue and mural at Peter May Sports Centre in November. Playing fields are where sport begins and, for the gifted few, like Harry Kane, they are where careers begin. Despite being England's all-time record goal scorer and captain, Harry has never forgotten his roots, and it was great to see him in person reflecting on and expressing his gratitude for those early influences back at the ground where it all began for him.

One of the best kept secrets of the year

In keeping with our commitment to build on the Lionesses' Euros success in 2022, we launched the Girls' Football Hub in September. This bespoke project sets out to help girls new to football who might lack the confidence, technical ability and game experience to play on a regular basis.

It does this by providing a female friendly environment where the focus is on making new friends, fun through learning and playing without pressure or judgement. The project also seeks to increase the number of women taking up managing and coaching roles so that new players can be inspired by female role models. Initial numbers are very encouraging, and we look forward to seeing the project grow over the next two years.

In looking back at a year of outstanding achievements, it would be remiss of us not to thank our wonderful staff, Trustees and volunteers. We would like to use this occasion to publicly thank them for their outstanding expertise, dedication and commitment over the past year. Their contribution has been invaluable.

Our vision is to create a happier, healthier and more cohesive London by encouraging more people to play sport and be physically active on accessible, affordable and attractive playing fields. These fields are much more than just open space - they are places where lives can be transformed physically, mentally and socially.

OUR PLAYING FIELDS

Our seven grounds across five London boroughs serve over 210,000 individuals annually, supporting their fitness and sporting journeys. We provide high-quality, affordable sports pitches for schools, clubs and community groups. Underpinned by sports development principles, our goal is to create a sporting habit for life.

Modernising, managing and maintaining these playing fields is costly, with only 43p recouped from hiring charges for every pound invested in pitch upkeep. We rely on generous support from donors, grants, and fundraising income from a range of events to deliver our charitable objectives. Against a wider backdrop of increasing pressure on councils to build more homes and reduce their operational spending, we demonstrate the value of well-managed playing fields as a means of creating happier, healthier and safer communities.

OUR PROJECTS

We are committed to addressing inequalities in accessing physical activity and sporting opportunities by engaging with London's disadvantaged and inactive groups via innovative projects like Coping Through Football and Green Hearts.

PLAYING FIELD PROTECTION

We are the first port of call from community groups worried about the loss of a local field. Guided by our mantra of "no net loss" of pitches, we oppose the loss of these vital spaces and via our Playing Fields Charter for London and Fields at Risk Register, we have saved over 20 sites from being lost for current and future generations.





WHY WE DO IT

We recognise that the benefits of sport extend well beyond the pitch to have a lasting impact on physical and mental health, community cohesion and the aspirations of young people.

By ensuring that our facilities are accessible and affordable we have been able to engage with socially and economically disadvantaged groups.

Recent research underscores the immense value of green spaces, contributing over £91 billion in asset value and £5 billion annually in services to Londoners.

Furthermore, active lifestyles significantly improve health outcomes and mental well-being, reducing the burden of chronic diseases and enhancing quality of life.

In London, access to sports facilities remains a challenge, with only 8% of the nation's playing fields located within the confines of the M25 corridor.

As we have demonstrated on our own sites, their long-term viability depends on being optimally used so that they contribute to widening, increasing and sustaining participation in sport and physical activity across the capital.

OPENING A REFURBISHED PITCH FOR A NEW GENERATION

The occasion also marked the official opening of the newly refurbished 3G pitch at Douglas Eyre Sports Centre, which will continue to serve as a home for schools, various community clubs and projects such as Coping Through Football, our flagship mental health project. In a fitting tribute, local schoolgirls showcased their football skills on the new surface, demonstrating the inclusive spirit and transformational potential of accessible, affordable and attractive facilities.

The event brought together supporters, funders, club representatives and community members, all united in their admiration for The Duke's long-standing commitment to grassroots sport and his belief in the power of playing fields to bring people together.

The 50th Anniversary celebration was almost 35 years to the day since The Duke officially opened the new Douglas Eyre Sports Centre back in 1989. In the intervening years the venue has gone on to exemplify the Foundation's drive to improve lives through sport and physical activity.

In addition to implementing a usage policy underpinned by sports development principles, the centre has also hosted a number of groundbreaking initiatives aimed at addressing health, economic and social inequalities.

Fifty years on, we remain deeply thankful for His Royal Highness's support and look forward to the continued impact of our partnership. His belief in our mission strengthens our resolve to ensure that everyone, regardless of background, has the opportunity to play, grow, and thrive through sport.



THE START OF THE FOOTBALL JOURNEY

Thanks to the tireless efforts of the Waltham Forest School Games Organisers, over 1,000 girls already participate in tournaments at Peter May and Douglas Eyre Sports Centres each year. But for many, that first taste of competitive play does not translate into regular participation. The gap between school games and club football remains too wide for those who feel unready or unsupported.

The Girls' Football Hub is our answer. By offering monthly mini-festivals, the Hub creates a gentle, pressure-free introduction to organised football. Here, girls can gain valuable match experience without the anxiety that often accompanies club trials or league games.

These sessions are designed to be fun, friendly and confidence-building with the ultimate goal of easing the transition into weekly grassroots club football.

Across the country, the health of youth football relies heavily on volunteers with up to 90% of team managers being parents (mainly fathers) of the players. To address this imbalance and increase female representation in coaching roles, the project also delivers bespoke coaching workshops for women. These sessions aim to demystify the coaching process and empower women with the skills and confidence to manage and support girls' teams.

Another area of need in the grassroots girls' game is goalkeeping. Competent goalkeepers are in short supply and opportunities to specialise in this vital position are few and far between.


The Douglas Eyre Girls' Football Hub runs monthly goalkeeping clinics specifically for girls, led by the Colchester United 1st Team Goalkeeping Coach. The aim is for parents to support him in the delivery of the sessions so that there is the dual benefit of improving their coaching skills and their daughters' goalkeeping technique.



In the wake of the Lionesses' stunning triumph in the UEFA Women's European Championships in 2022, the Foundation recognised a once-in-a-generation opportunity to turn inspiration into participation.

Yet, despite the wave of national pride and rising enthusiasm for women's football, the statistics paint a worrying picture: 49% of adolescent girls drop out of sport, mostly due to low self-esteem, fear of judgement and concerns about body image.

To tackle these barriers head-on, we launched the Girls' Football Hub, an initiative dedicated to making football more accessible, inclusive and welcoming for girls who might otherwise slip through the cracks. Delivered on the newly refurbished 3G pitch at Douglas Eyre Sports Centre, the Hub provides a female-friendly space that prioritises girls new to football, especially those who lack the confidence, experience or technical ability to join a team.

OUR PHILOSOPHY: MORE THAN A GAME

The ethos of the Girls' Football Hub is grounded in the belief that football should be safe, fun and inclusive for every girl. That is why Sunday mornings on the 3G pitch at the venue are exclusively reserved for the Girls' Hub.

The underpinning principles are simple but powerful:

- → Maximal involvement and playing time
- → Learning through enjoyment
- → Building confidence and self-belief
- → Playing without pressure or judgement
- → Fostering friendships and teamwork
- → Promoting collaboration between clubs
- → Respect for all: teammates, opponents, and the game itself

LOOKING AHEAD

By creating a space where girls feel welcomed, encouraged and empowered, the Girls' Football Hub is setting a new standard for inclusion in community sport. The early signs are promising and with continued support, we believe this model can inspire similar initiatives across London.

Thanks to our partners, donors and volunteers we are ensuring that every girl who dreams of playing football has the chance to learn, grow and thrive in the game that she loves.


HARRY KANE STATUE UNVEILED AT PETER MAY SPORTS CENTRE

On 18th November 2024, just one day after scoring his 69th goal for England in a match against Ireland at Wembley, Harry Kane returned to his roots for the unveiling of a statue in his honour at Peter May Sports Centre.

The statue, sculpted by Peter Moulton in 2020, had been in storage for four years while a suitable location was sought. The Foundation played a key role in bringing the statue to its final home, with CEO Alex Welsh reaching out to Waltham Forest Councillor Emma Best and the Kane family to propose the Peter May Sports Centre, a location that holds deep personal significance for Kane. It was here, as an eight-year-old playing for Ridgeway Rovers, that his football journey began.

The statue stands in front of a specially commissioned mural by Marc Silver of Murwalls, which illustrates Harry's journey from grassroots football to becoming England captain and all-time top goal scorer. The unveiling ceremony featured two current Ridgeway Rovers players, Myla Shaw and Jayden Alexander, symbolising the passing of inspiration to the next generation. Clearly moved by the tribute, Harry said "It's quite humbling to see it here now, knowing there's going to be loads of kids walking past and hopefully being inspired."

More than a celebration of an individual, the statue serves as a lasting reminder of the power of sport and the vital role that local playing fields play in nurturing talent, character and ambition.

On Thursday 21st November, the Lancaster Ballroom at The Savoy once again played host to our flagship event, the LPFF Gala Dinner. With 250 guests in attendance, the evening was a spectacular celebration of the power of sport to improve lives.

Vice President Martin Bayfield starred as our inimitable host, bringing warmth, humour and charm to the evening's proceedings. Guests were moved and inspired by stories from Jo, Shona and Matt, who shared the stunning impact of our new Girls' Football Hub programme at Douglas Eyre Sports Centre.

We were delighted to welcome broadcaster, author and maths champion Bobby Seagull as our after-dinner speaker. His reflections on the role of sport in his childhood added a personal and heartfelt touch. The ever-charismatic Charlie Ross led the Live Auction with flair, helping us raise an impressive £140,000, despite a challenging fundraising climate.

In March the Foundation said a fond farewell to longstanding Trustee Andy Sutch who stood down from the Council. After 27 years as a Trustee and at least another ten years of strategic support as Sport England Regional Director for London prior to that, his contribution to the LPFF cause cannot be overstated.

A massive champion for playing fields and the sports played on them, it was no accident that once the Sports Lottery was launched in 1994, the Foundation become one of the early beneficiaries of significant capital grants for Peter May Sports Centre and Fairlop Oak Playing Field.

Not satisfied with merely modernising the LPFF's current stock of playing fields, Andy showed the instincts of a bloodhound in identifying vulnerable sports grounds and then mediating with Sport England and London Marathon Charitable Trust to ensure that LPFF stepped in to save the day on three separate sites in Greenwich, Redbridge and Greenford over the space of eight years.

Thanks to Andy's vision, the Foundation moved from an organisation that disposed of playing fields to one that rescued them.

As Chair of the Funding and Communications Committee for twelve years, his passion, commitment and innovative thinking were such an inspiration for staff and fellow trustees alike. Even after retirement, his love and enthusiasm for the Foundation endures and he remains a committed member of the LPFF Quiz Organising Committee.




